I am pleased to announce that LWVMC is part of an exciting project to encourage more



women to run for political office. The White House Project, an organization founded in 1998 by Marie Wilson, is a national, nonpartisan, not-for-profit organization whose mission is to advance women's leadership in all communities and sectors, up to the US

presidency.

In order to achieve this mission, The White House Project created Vote Run Lead, a training program held in several cities throughout the country to educate women on how to run for and be successful in office. The training program consists of speakers/educators who 1) encourage women to set aside their fears and doubts about running for office; 2) show them how to successfully run for office; and 3) teach women how to educate themselves on issues in their area in order to gain confidence in representing their constituents while in office.

Several organizations across Ohio, including the LWVMC, have joined together to sponsor this training program in Ohio. Ohio Go Run will be held June 6-8, 2008, at the Riffe Center and the Hyatt on Capitol Square. #### **Town Hall Set for March 12**

Fair Elections? Transparent Elections? Open Elections? The League of Women Voters of Metropolitan Columbus will be looking at these questions during a March 12 ImPACT Town Hall Meeting starting at 7:00 PM at the Jewish Community Center, 1125 College Avenue, Columbus, 43209.

The speaker for the evening is Daniel Tokaji, a professor at The Ohio State University Moritz College of Law, who along with professors Steven Huefner and Edward Foley just finished a yearlong study of election systems in the Midwest. This study, From Registration to Recounts: The Election Ecosystems of Five Midwestern States, received support from The Joyce Foundation, which also provides funding for LWVOEF's imPACT initiative.

To prepare for the Town Hall—as well as the February Units, consider some good election reform reading.

There are a few books floating around the membership but the easiest way to read the new Moritz College project is to go to <a href="mailto:moritzlaw.osu.edu/electionlaw/joyce/index.php">moritzlaw.osu.edu/electionlaw/joyce/index.php</a>. Special attention should be given to "Chapter 3: Ohio's Election Ecosystem, A Poster Child for Reform".

When League volunteers deliver Meals on Wheels, the LWVMC Ed Fund increases its financial coffers; drivers perform a needed community service; and Columbus residents get a hot meal.

#### Meals on Wheels FAQ

#### How often will I deliver?

It depends on you, but either once a month or once every other month.

#### What's the procedure?

Arrive at LifeCare Alliance by 10:00 AM on your designated Sunday. Pick up the route binder and that day's list of

deliveries. Spend a few minutes doing paperwork and then collect the cold bags and heated bags filled with meals. After delivering the meals, head back to LifeCare to return the items.



You'll be completely finished by 12:30 PM.

#### What if I don't know the west side?

No problem. The first few times you will ride with experienced drivers to get a general idea about the route. In addition, the route binder includes maps, special instructions, and phone numbers.

#### How many meals will I deliver?

It varies. In general, though, there are 10-14 stops. At some stops, you'll deliver more than one meal.

#### What if I have a small car/trunk?

It won't be a problem. You'll need enough space in your trunk, back seat, and/or front seat to hold 2-3 cold/hot bags. The bags are similar to those used by pizza delivery shops, but a bit deeper.

#### Do I need a helper?

One person can easily handle the driving and delivery. Of course you can always make it a family affair or a way to socialize and catch up with a friend.
